INTRODUCTION

Who could ever imagine that the inherent yearning to make a difference of a few people who started Dream a Dream would gather so much thrust and give rise to an upheaval that is contributing to the restoration of hope, happiness, and stability and so much more to the childhoods of so many children from vulnerable communities!

Never losing faith in our vision and mission, in 2004 we soared forward reaching newer heights, battling complex challenges, making consequential decisions, exploring newer vistas all hoping to give more and more dreams a touch of reality!

From humble beginnings with 15 odd kids, this year saw an increase in the number of kids to around 350 kids with the partnership with Sukrupa, a community center for slum children. This year also saw an extraordinary and rapid expansion in the number of programmes, with more structured systems of functioning in place. The Volunteer graph maintained a steady growth ensuring the presence of more volunteers at Dream a Dream, contributing fresh and unique perspectives. The Fund raising front saw unbelievable escalation from a modest sum of 7 Lakh collected last year to a whopping 23 Lakh in 2004-2005. The management coped with new developments that eventually led to an increase in office staff with more well defined job roles.

The year 2004 Dream a Dream became a melting pot of cultural diversity as we welcomed International delegations from countries like Palestine, Kenya, Egypt and Greece that gave the volunteers a platform to exchange ideas, values and understand the effects of a changing world. This year Dream A Dream was joined by a Volunteer from the USA thereby promoting further cultural interchange.

A high-profile US delegation of US Consul TERM Members visited Dream A Dream on 15th February 2005. They visited Ananya and BOSCO where interactive programmes were planned for them along with the children. The inspired delegation went back and raised funds for all three organizations.

Under the aegis of GIVE Foundation, ICICI Prudential Life Insurance earmarked Insurance policies for 10 children from our partner NGOs – Ananya and Vishwas which will contribute Rs. 20,000 into each child's education fund as they reach an age of 18.

Undoubtedly the year 2004-2005 at Dream a Dream, can best be described as a year of "Soaring High"!

Key achievements:

350 Children: This year the magic multiplied, the number of smiles that beamed at Dream a dream and miracles we encountered magnified to a large extent as we reached a target of 350 children, an increase in over 150 kids since last year once our partnership with NGO Sukrupa fell through along with active involvement with our NGO partner, Bosco mane!

6 New Programmes: The main prerogative with the increase in the number of children was to logically introduce new programmes and begin new ventures. After much brain storming and planning, new innovative ideas were followed up, this marked the inception of our new activities with objectives that aimed at helping children imbibe life skills, expand their horizons, provide them exposure like never before, instill in them confidence and self belief, provide them platforms to recognize their true potential and much more. The year 2004-2005 catapulted our programmes to new level altogether and launched the following:

300% increase in funds raised: With a stable rise in the number of activities what was imperative was a stable source of funds to keep the momentum going. The fundraising team stepped in, kept a close watch out for all new opportunities and introduced novel and ground-breaking methods of fundraising. All the persistence and endurance paid off as one of the highlights of the year 2004-2005 was the collection of 23 Lakh as funds by the following events and campaigns:

PROGRAMMES & ACTIVITIES

Life skills, as defined by the World Health Organization are self-awareness and ability to handle stress and emotions, problem solving and decision making, creative and critical thinking and interpersonal skills and communication. Dream a Dream, as an organization works towards the empowerment and integration of underprivileged children into the mainstream, by focusing on building life skills in children through sustained programs.

Dream Sports Programme:



Hockey: The Hockey Programme began in June 2003 in partnership with the Dhanraj Ballal Hockey Academy. Dhanraj Ballal Hockey Academy was founded by Padma Shree Dhanraj Pillai and Arjuna Puraskar winner Ashish Ballal, both Olympians with over a decade of experience. The Hockey Academy is located at Bangalore and trains youngsters in the age group of 16-21 years. The aim of the academy is to produce players who could represent the country in the Olympics and in other international events.

In the first working year of the programme (June 2003 to Feb 2004) 20 children from two different NGOs were part of the programme - Ananya - 16 (June) & Ashwini Trust - 4 (July)

Year II: June 2004 to March 2005: The second year of the programme began in June 2004 and presently involves 27 children from three different NGOs. The children are aged between 10 to 16 years.

The Children:

Age Group: Thirteen (13) children are between the ages of 11 to 13 years, 9 children are between the age of 14 to 16 years and three are between 8 to 10 years.

Duration in the programme: Twelve (12) children from Ananya are in their second year of the hockey programme while three have joined this year. The remaining 13 children from Sukrupa and Bosco have joined the programme in the year 2004-2005.

The children from the different NGOs interact freely. The girls and boys play with equal gusto and are given equal opportunity and responsibility in the game. Children from the different NGOs have developed good bonds of friendship and look forward to meeting each other at the practices. They are quick to enquire if any member is absent for a session.

Table Tennis:

Dream a Dream aligned with Winner's Choice Sports Foundation spear-headed by former International Vasanth Bharadwaj (Winner's Choice was opened in 1993 by Vasanth Bharadwaj, who played Table Tennis on India's national team from 1984-1992. At the height of his career, he was ranked 2nd in India, and has won many national level matches), to start a Table Tennis training programme in June 2003. The program is broken into three quarters of three months each. During the fourth quarter, students are on holiday. If the academy has a summer program being offered efforts are made to encourage the children to join the summer program. During the first year, the 12 children from Ananya between the ages of 9 and 12 participated in the program. The second year of the program began in June 2004 and presently involved 16 children from partner organization, Ananya, between the ages of 9 and 13.

Two children in the TT program, Devappa and Chandamma left Ananya and therefore did not return to the program this year. During the course of the year, three children dropped out – Vimala, Pramila and Pratap. Seven new children joined the program in the year 2004-2005.



Five of the children have participated in a tournament with mainstream children to date. More such tournament involvement is being planned. Mr. Bharadwaj has indicated that five of the children show great promise, and he would like to integrate them into the mainstream Table Tennis program at Winner's Choice. He believes that with proper training, they can play Table Tennis at least at the state level.

Key Achievements from the Dream Sports Programme:

- The children have been consistent in their attendance. Every session has an average of 70-80% attendance
- Many children who were aggressive and disruptive have become more focused and calm through an exposure to the sport. Their excessive energies have been channelised into something positive.
- The girls who are part of the programme have gained tremendous confidence through this exposure which has also helped them improve in other activities
- There has been a steady improvement in appreciation of the other's talent among all the participants. Especially boys who earlier thought Hockey and Table Tennis were man's game have begun to acknowledge women players and even respect them.
- The project has created tremendous interest among other children who are not yet part of the programme and they are really keen to join the programme.
- Star Sports/Star News and Sahara News have given coverage to the Hockey programme thus making the children proud of themselves.
- The association of Ashish Ballal, Dhanraj Pillai and Vasanth Bharadwaj itself has been a highlight of the project because the children are training directly under the best.
- The games have also greatly inspired the children to set goals in their lives especially when they see the Indian Team perform. Players from the Indian Hockey Team have met and interacted with the children and greatly inspired them
- Exposure to sports has given a platform for these children to channelise their immense energies into constructive learning

Chikku Booku Samaya:

A reading programme aimed at improving reading habits among children from vulnerable communities through the medium of storybooks, creative activities and games. This programme is a Collaborative Endeavour with Akshara Foundation and Hippocampus Reading Foundation. The pilot initiated in 2003 led to a 24-session curriculum based programme in 2004 that started in July 2004.



June 2004 saw a rigorous 2-day workshop where Dream A Dream volunteers were trained with the skills of teaching. Since these sessions were meant to be different from the regular classes, Volunteers were taught to incorporate music, art, mime, drama and a lot more into teaching to make learning fun! An insight into understanding the curriculum and using the manual book designed by Teacher Training Foundation helped the volunteers understand the objective of the programme better.

This initiative "Chikku Booku Samaya" that literally translates to "Small Book Time" was

conducted at 4 Government school across Bangalore:

- JJR Nagar Urdu Primary School
- Vijnapura School
- Government School at DJ Halli
- Government School ay Yarabnagar

The following months witnessed rapid progress, the volunteers, now better equipped, and regularly visited the schools every Saturday where the children along with the volunteers were transported to a magical realm of enchanted forests, interesting characters, wild animals, fragrant flowers, colourful balloons, multicolored dreams and a lot more! The games, activities related to drawing, drama, music and elementary word puzzles added a dash of fun and excitement. The number of kids stayed constant, the volunteers provided tremendous support, Akshara and Hippocampus continued to play their vital roles collecting feedback and assessing the growth of the children. Slowly the inherent desire of the kids to learn was tapped.

Caterpillar & Butterfly Dance Therapy Programme:

This programme involves the children at Freedom foundation and is conducted and facilitated by danseuse Brinda Jacob (Founder & Trustee, Dream A Dream).

Music and Dance have been considered from time immemorial as the best form of self-expression. Whether it is the rustling of the leaves when the zephyrs gently blow or the lashing of the waves that dance on the shore, everywhere we find music and dance bringing us closer to the oneness of the universe. We at Dream a Dream wanted the kids to feel this magic, help them discard their inhibitions, help them explore their freedom of self expression, and draw strength from music, energy, rhythm and rhyme! This initiative began in October 2004 with support from Charities Aid Foundation, India (CAF).

This programme is two pronged: On one hand Brinda Jacob conducted dance sessions involving exercises and activities to help children explore the contemporary dance form. On the other hand every weekend, therapy sessions were scheduled with support from therapist Tripura Kashyap where the children were given a chance to explore their joys, hopes, fears, dreams and

aspirations, likes, dislikes among others to help them discover themselves through the medium of dance movements and art.

Amidst the tapping feet, swinging heads, waving hands, pirouettes and swirls, smiles and gleaming eyes began to emerge beautiful butterflies, metamorphosing from within their cocoons, prancing and dancing while the world watched in awe!

Dream Computer programme:

In the summer of 2004, NIIT had sponsored a 12-hour computer-training programme for children at Dream A Dream. This led to an insightful realization that the self-confidence of the children went soaring high when they learnt computers. They thoroughly enjoyed the learning experience. When we took this insight to Mr. Girish Krishnamurthy and Mr. Nagesh Karuturi, well-wishers of Dream A Dream; they decided to do something about it and soon Dream A Dream had its own Dream Computer Programme.

In February 2005, the first batch of 10 children from partner Ananya engaged in computer training sessions at KAPS IT Solutions Pvt. Ltd. (A company run by Mr. Raviraj who graciously allowed us the use of his premises). Each batch had 10-12 children and two batches of 6 weeks each were conducted in 2004. Mr. Rajkumar Rao, Dean of Center for American Education designed and executed the workshops and Shashank Gupta, volunteer coordinated the programme.

Tapping of keys and clicking of mouses continued while the children took on the cyber mania! However, the overall approach to this programme has improved with trained volunteers and a well-designed curriculum, and learning computers with fun ensues. Jalaja Pillai from IBM got a Volunteer grant of \$ 1000 for the programme that will be utilized in the year 2005-2006 to scale the programme.



Dream Drama Program:

Drama is known to have varied impact on children, it makes them receptive, improves focus and concentration, helps them hone their communication skills, gives them a scope to identify the power of their imagination and above all helps improve self confidence to a great extent!

Sindya Narayanaswamy, a volunteer from Indicorp, U. S. A. joined Dream A Dream in October 2004 to initiate, design and execute the programme. Keen to begin the Dream Drama program, she began ground work on the programme, soon with a pilot in place; December saw the Dream Drama program take off at partner NGO, Vishwas.

The Dream Drama program aims at providing children exposure to dramatics by conducting weekly sessions with the kids that include numerous fun exercises to improve voice, movement and body language, expression, concentration and communication skills, by taking the kids to watch movies and plays from time to time and by bringing in Theatre professionals to conduct workshops to add that finishing touch! The success of this programme is due to the enthusiasm of the kids and the high-energy volunteers like Srinivas, Mitesh, Anjali, Suchitra, Nitin and Srikrishna. Team Lease came forward to support the programme with a financial contribution.

Dream Outdoor programme:

In the month of April / May 2004 Dream A Dream launched its star programme - The Dream Outdoor Programme in association with The Adventurers – A Wilderness School and supported by Mckinsey India through funds raised at the Mumbai Marathon, BJN Hotels Ltd and Infineon Technologies Ltd.

The primary focus of this project is to provide high-quality outdoor programs to children from vulnerable communities. In the process, critical life skills are built, thereby empowering the children and pushing forward the process of integrating them into the mainstream.



This programme is truly an exhilarating one and a super-hit among our kids! The first outdoor programme began in April 2004 with a trek from Saklespur to Kukke Subramanya in the rugged and lush green terrain of the Western Ghats after which four batches followed suit. The kids slept on tarpaulin on the forest floor while the lonely clouds played hide and seek with the stars above them and the fireflies danced around them, they woke up and walked through jungle trails looking for waterfalls and rainbows and hung from the boughs of trees in the mango groves. 58 children

participated in the programme in four batches.

They learned to help each other, watch out for one another and rough it out in the wild, wild Western Ghats! The children knowingly and unknowingly learnt little lessons while they followed instructions to the 't', made quick decisions when the going got tough, trusted their instincts and recognized in them a sort of 'never say die' spirit!

In October, we continued the Outdoor Programme by taking batches of children to Honnemardu, a camp site on the banks of the river Sharavathi run by The Adventurers. The trip was structured as a four day, three-night visit to Honnemardu.

81 children attended the trips in five different batches, in October 2004, November 2004, December 2004, January 2005 & March 2005. There were 58 boys and 23 girls overall. Each batch of children was accompanied by Dream A Dream volunteers and staff.

The outdoor programme has also been a life changing experience for our volunteers, they returned with lovely memories to last a life time... everyone would agree that this programme has made a world of difference by teaching myriad lessons to our children and volunteers alike.

"The trek with Dream a Dream children was one of the highlights of our nine-month tour around the world. We are happy that we got to participate in something important and that we could be of use. We felt that the outdoor education programme was very successful; the children learned a lot and enjoyed themselves very much. They got along with each other very well; they were very helpful and worked together as a team. It was fantastic to see the children observe the nature and play in the water. The children took pride in teaching us some Kannada and they were very eager to learn words and songs in

I witnessed in the kids - the courage, determination, flip-flop bundles of energy, the sense of binding which they had developed. Spoken English Programme:

When some children at Dream A Dream expressed an eager desire to learn to speak English, Dream A Dream decided to approach Mphasis and its HR Team. In no time, the volunteer from the community outreach department at Mphasis designed a 16 hr module spread over 4 sessions. Even though each session was for 4 hrs each it was amazing to see how the volunteers were able to sustain interest levels and enthusiasm throughout. 10 children from partner Sukrupa participated in the programme.

The programme covered Vocabulary building, grammar, reading and also certain group activities that inculcated team skills amongst the children. The volunteers who facilitated this programme were trainers by profession.

GE volunteers at Vishwas, another Dream A Dream partner, carried this program forward. The volunteers not only executed the module developed by Mphasis but added their own modules on the way and continue to run the programme in 2005-2006.

Dream Tsunami Project:

In December 2004 our country was hit by a grave and unexpected catastrophe that left so many shattered, the Tsunami affected thousands of children across the southeastern coast. Dream A Dream in order to initiate an outreach programme visited the some of the Tsunami affected areas near Karaikal along with Shristi Special Academy.

The objective of the 3-day trip was to assess the situation especially of the children and see what role Dream A Dream and Shristi can play in helping the children deal with the emotional shock with positive reinforcement activities. A needs assessment of the residents of the Tsunami affected areas, specifically the children in order to design a long-term program that will facilitate recuperation and re-integration of the children into normalcy. This paved the way to our 'Dream Tsunami Project'.

Pattanicherri is a small hamlet in TR Pattinam about 11 km from Nagapattinam. The village was completely devastated. The Small Government School in Pattanicherri had been doing a yeoman's service by continuing to run classes for the children and keeping them engaged. When, they called us to come and conduct fun games and activities with the children, we jumped at the opportunity. We designed a 6-month module, whereby once a month, for 3-days a bunch of volunteers would visit the school and conduct a series of games / creative based activities with

the children. In addition, we cleaned up the school premises, painted the school walls and built an interesting bond with the children and the villagers.

The highlight of the trip was when in the fifth trip, the children accompanied the volunteers to the sea and enjoyed themselves playing and jumping around in the water.

Dream Fundays:

Dream Fundays are ½-day to 1-day fun and learning programmes that expose the children to new activities, experiences and learnings. These are fun-filled programmes and also help to build healthy interactions between children and volunteers.

Volunteer involvement is undisputedly directly proportional to the growth and progress, fun and excitement at Dream a Dream. Our volunteers ranging from diverse backgrounds are the driving force behind all our programmes. Without their involvement, their enthusiasm, their ideas and suggestions and yearning to make a difference to and at Dream A Dream, we would never be able to move ahead.

The rate of inducting new volunteers has been on a rise since the previous year and our database now proudly has 350 new volunteers. In 2004, vital developments took place on the Volunteer involvement front. A **Volunteer Management Team** was launched in 2004 with an objective to boost volunteer involvement. A group of 6 senior and active volunteers formed the core team and worked towards issues of Volunteer Involvement, Communication, Commitment, Motivation and Retention.

The VMT organized a Dream forum on March 28th 2004 to engage volunteers in brainstorming about Volunteer Management. Facilitated by Erehwon Consulting, The Dream Forum was truly a milestone in Dream a Dream history. Thirty-three eager minds churned out ideas so quickly that the Volunteer Management Team could hardly manage! The ideas were as brilliant as they were numerous... promoting Dream a Dream by ensuring we display merchandise like Dream A Dream mouse pads on our desks, having a road show for more publicity, meeting the HR Managers of big companies for more funds, working as an effective volunteer body through teams and phone-groups. Moreover, the coming together of so many volunteers with the sole purpose of pushing Dream A Dream forward was most amazing!

We at Dream a Dream believe in equipping our volunteers with expertise to facilitate our programmes with ease and constantly conduct workshops to train them and have volunteer discussions and meetings to assess the feedback and evaluate impact and growth of our programmes.

Workshops with Catherine Sluggett

- Dream a Dream held a two-day workshop to create a forum for discussion on HIV and sexuality. Cath Sluggett, a freelance trainer on gender, sexuality and HIV, held the workshop on June 5th and 12th. The workshop was important to help sensitize the volunteers to a lot of issues we may come across while interacting with children. The aim was to equip volunteers with skills and information to confidently talk to children and young people in the Dream a Dream program, about HIV and how to prevent it. Through a process of interactive learning involving games, exercises, role-plays and personal introspection, volunteers examined their own understandings, attitudes and barriers to looking at sexuality. Some key areas explored in discussion over the two days were pleasure, violations, gender, health, rights, norms, sexual desire, sexual activity and sexual identity.
- Following this workshop, Cath Sluggett conducted a workshop on Child Rights. The participating volunteers were exposed to various International laws and treaties ratified by various States that envisioned all the rights of children across the world. Discussions and activities brought to the forefront innumerable issues the volunteers had never imagined before existed and made them realise how unaware they were about laws regarding the same! This workshop was also designed to help volunteers conduct these workshops for the other volunteers in the future.

Workshop on Games for peace and Co operation: 7th and 8th August 2004, Dream A Dream in association with "Play For Peace" presented a 2-day workshop for volunteers, partner organizations and others interested in the area of "Games for Cooperation and Not Competition."

The training programme aimed to cover the concept of co-operative learning and how competition affects human behaviour. Sessions were conducted where participants looked at how to convert competitive games into cooperative games without reducing the challenge level. Issues of working in a team were addressed while playing games. By the end of training program the volunteers learnt at least 30-35 new games and documented them for future reference.

Volunteer Cultural Interchange:

A team of international visitors from Kenya, Nairobi, Palestine and Egypt came to visit Dream A Dream through a Delhi-based NGO called Crea. On 19th April they participated in a Football Match with children after which a dinner was hosted for them. This cultural exchange truly touched chords in the hearts and minds of our volunteers.

Discussions helped us to strengthen our belief in our work when we heard them use the same ideas successfully in their communities - be it the sports programmes, creativity programme, reading programme or promoting interaction among diverse groups of children. They had many questions about our volunteer programme and how we had been able to create such a strong volunteer force. It was a delightful realization to see what Dream a Dream had created with volunteers! While most organizations were struggling to get committed volunteers, Dream A Dream has never really had a problem with that. It was time to reflect and pride on our core strength - the volunteers.

Workshop on Social Consciousness and Tolerance:

Dream a Dream organized a volunteer workshop on the issue of social consciousness and tolerance, on Sunday 13th March 2005. The workshop aimed at developing in each one, sensitivity about their prejudices and stereotypes, in-groups and out-groups and how these can lead to discrimination and even war. Since Dream a Dream works with underprivileged children, who come from a very different social background from that of our volunteers, this workshop was a good opportunity to raise the level of sensitivity and social consciousness of the volunteers. Smita Trivedi, Ed.M. and Sheeba Jacob, Ed.M. from Harvard University, U.S.A conducted the workshop.

Other Workshops:

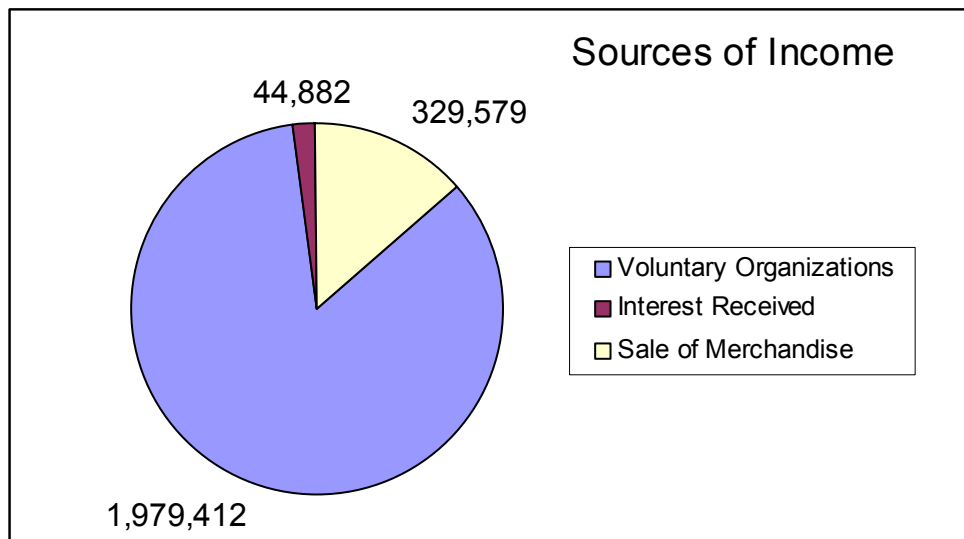
These include workshops related to our programmes like Reading for Real, Computer programme, Dream Tsunami Project, etc.

Volunteer Outing:

On 30th March 2005 around 30 volunteers went to watch the movie "My Brother Nikhil", it was a nice evening where volunteers came together and enjoyed the movie which co incidentally dealt with a sensitive issue related to AIDS and HIV. Outings such as these help in creating a stronger bond between the volunteers and are a great way to get to know other volunteers and exchange notes on various things.

FUNDRAISING ACTIVITIES

Fundraising at Dream a Dream is truly distinctive and unique for the prime reason it involves the Community and creates awareness at the same time! Most of our fundraising programmes involve getting people from society to feel responsible and pitch in to generate a wave of change that creates a ripple effect!



This year saw the collection of up to 22 lakhs by our perseverant and tenacious fundraising team by incorporating methods ranging from bizarre like a stall selling Dream merchandise at a wedding to the regular well-known techniques that included the following:

- Dream A Dream in association with Symphony Services presented '**A Goan Theme For A Dream**', co-sponsored by MSN, a fundraising dinner at Opus, a Goan-cuisine restaurant on 11th June. A huge turn out of many Dream A Dream volunteers and friends made this an unforgettable experience while they indulged in the live music, great ambience and food for a cause!
- Dream A Dream in association with Bangalore Silicon City JayCees (BSCJC) presented "**Swara Raga Sangama 2004**" an evening of enthralling classical music. This three-day carnatic musical extravaganza was held at the renowned Gayana Samaja from 2nd July to 4th July 2004 and the cost per ticket was Rs.100 per day. The ticket sale proceeds were divided 50% between JayCees and Dream A Dream to be utilized towards community initiatives of both the organizations.
- **Dream Newspaper campaign:** Launched in July 2004 where Dream a Dream urged individuals and Companies to pledge their newspapers to Dream A Dream, the sale of which would generate funds every month for various programmes. As more and more companies and individuals are joining hands with us in this fundraising strategy this campaign is growing by leaps and bounds!



- **Dream A Dream** partnered with a group of restaurants from the **BJN Group** (Aromas of China, Samarkand, Bamboo Shoots, Angeethi, Bombay Post and Indijoe) whereby starting 15th July 2004, Re. 1 was added to each bill that is generated at each of the restaurants for both lunch and dinner. The simple campaign has tremendous potential and raised over Rs. 7,000 every month.

- **The Colonial Cousins** were back together for a mesmerizing performance in support of Dream A Dream on Sunday, 26th September 2004, at The Palace Grounds. Donor Passes were available in denominations of Rs. 250/- and Rs. 500/- per head. The Event Organizers, Seamless Ventures, contributed 60% of all ticket sales to Dream A Dream. The event was a huge success and the duo belted out song after song while the crowds swayed to the music in aid of Dream A Dream children.



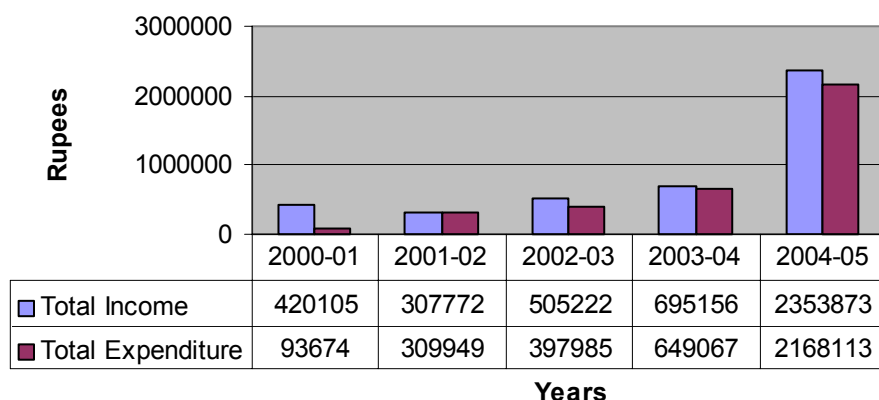
- **McDonald's Bangalore** celebrated World Children's week from the 14th of November till the 21st of November 2004 and tied up with Dream a Dream as well as a charitable hospital for children. During this week, McDonald's sold special pencils which had "World's Children's Day" written on them at Rs.5. They also tied up with Sony Music and the new album of Destiny's Child was launched at McDonalds after which they were sold at music stores. 25% of the MRP from the music albums went towards the World's Children's Day Week. 50% of all money raised through both these promotions came to Dream a Dream.
- **Punyakoti:** Rangoli Dance Company run by US based Malathi Iyengar and Nadam Dance Academy put up a Kannada Children's Folktale called "Punyakoti" - A unique dance and music play in aid of Dream A Dream at ADA Rangamandira on 26th December, 2004.
- **Listen, Janamejaya!** - Krishna, an active volunteer with Dream A Dream directed a play, "Listen, Janamejaya" in aid of Dream A Dream. He had earlier directed a very successful play "Can't Pay, Won't Pay" in aid of Dream A Dream as well. The play ran into two packed houses and the performance was much appreciated!
- **Standard Chartered International Mumbai Marathon:** The second edition of the Marathon woke Mumbai from its slumber attracting nearly 25,000 participants and drawing hordes more onto the streets of the city. The April 2004 issue of Stardust Magazine had a photograph of Bollywood Film Actress Kajol and her sister Tanisha wearing Dream A Dream T-shirts.... as part of the Mumbai International Marathon that was held on Feb 15th 2004. In January 2005, the fervour only multiplied at the 2nd International Mumbai Marathon. Dream A Dream raised over Rs. 6.3 Lakhs at the Marathon with 9 volunteers running for our cause. Mckinsey was the key corporate contributor. Mr. Nagesh Karuturi, Regional Head, HP Sales' Mr. Chandrakumar, CE, Linc Software; and Mr. Akshay Jaitly, Partner, Trilegal were the key contributors who raised over Rs. 1 Lakh each.
- **Sale of Dream Calendars and Dream Merchandise:** Keeping with our staunch philosophy on Quality in everything that we do, Dream A Dream designed top-class desktop calendars for 2005. Designed by professional designer Ram Sinam, the Calendar explored Love, Beauty, Learning, Nurturing, Imagination and Celebration and was in great demand. In addition, other exciting merchandise designed by children - Greeting Cards, Tablemats, Coasters, Mouse pads, and Framed Art Work were also promoted and sold.
- **IBM steps in to help:** In July 2004, a group of employees from IBM got together and collected Rs. 4500 for Dream A Dream. Using this, they got a whole lot of creative material for our programmes. These included crayons, watercolours, scissors, color pencils

and a host of other materials that would last us for over a year for all our creative programmes with the children.

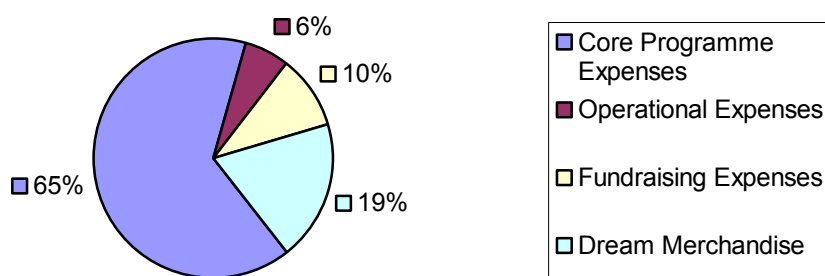
- **Donation By ICAPS:** In February 2005, Dream A Dream received Rs. 75,000 from ICaps towards our Dream Drama Program.
- **Dream Dance Nite at Taika:** After the success of Goan theme for a Dream in 2004, Dream A Dream organized Dream Dance Nite in association with Taika, The spa lounge on March 17th 2005. The turn out was unbelievable and invitees enjoyed themselves amidst the plush interiors, scintillating music, scrumptious food and drink. Over 500 Bangaloreans partied to raise money for Dream A Dream's Outdoor programme.
- **Washathon with Jonty Rhodes on 4th December 2004:** HLL organized a promotional campaign for their product Surf Excel along with Jonty Rhodes in 5 cities across India and in Bangalore, they partnered with Dream A Dream. Children from partner, BOSCO had a wonderful time playing a game of cricket with Jonty Rhodes and then scrubbing a cloth to reveal the new product. As part of the campaign, HLL contributed Rs. 1 Lakh to Dream A Dream for its Dream Sports Programme.
- **ICICI Prudential Life Insurance:** ICICI Prudential Life Insurance chose 10 children from our partner organizations, Ananya and Vishwas and gave them a Life Insurance Policy ensuring that these children would get Rs. 21,000/- benefit on completion of their 10th grade. The partnership was initiated with support from GIVE Foundation.
